Fine Dining Restaurants (fine dining, but not necessarily requiring formal attire)

Trattoria Delia, 152 Saint Paul Street

This restaurant has been serving old-world Italian cuisine reflecting the traditions and flavors of Italy's various regions since 1993. The chef works with local farmers to provide diners with the freshest of ingredients. This restaurant is known for its romantic ambience, extensive Italian wine list and good service.

Sotto Enoteca (Trattoria Delia), 152 St. Paul Street

LIVE MUSIC

Signal Kitchen, 71 Main Street

After being closed for several months this past winter, this popular recording studio and music venue downtown has reopened with a new bar area, which allows those who'd still like to watch some of the concert to get out of the main fray of people at the front of the basement stage.
